STOP I

Directions: The trail starts near Thame Town Hall, High Street. Standing at the entrance of the Town Hall, with your back to the doors, turn to the right and you will see 'Stop 1' in front of you - it is the plaque located to the right of the entrance of Greyhound Walk.

Challenge Questions:

- 1. When was John Hampden a scholar of Lord Williams's Grammar School? _____
- 2. Starting from the words 'With great courage' and counting from left to right, write down words 19, 40, 57, 71, and 102. What do the first letters of these words spell out?



STOP 2

Directions

- turn right while facing the plaque and walk along the Buttermarket to the Zebra crossing.
- cross the road and turn left to walk down North Street.
- cross over Wellington Street to continue down North Street to the first entrance to the Cattle Market Car Park.
- cross over this and you will find 'The Fish Bench' set back in the grass verge.

Challenge Questions:

- 1. How many fish can you find on the bench?
- 2. Scan the QR code. Looking at the section about the fish bench only, what are the 2 names of the house that would have been found at this location in the 15th Century?

STOP 3 Directions

- Carry on down North Street and turn right into the Cattle Market car park.
- Take care walking through the car park to the other side where you will find a pathway.
- The railings that line this pathway are the next stop on the trail.

Challenge Question:

One of the Roundheads shown on the railings is not actually a road in Lea Park. Do you know which which one, and and do you know what in Thame is named after this Roundhead instead? Stop 1 might give you a clue!



Directions

- Continue to the end of the railings and turn left into Parliament Road.
- Walk to the end of Parliament Road and turn left into Chalgrove Road.
- Turn left down Webster Close footpath, and at the bottom of this footpath turn left, and then right to walk along Pym Walk. Continue down it to meet Roundhead Drive.
- Turn right onto Roundhead Drive, and then almost immediately left into Harrison Place. You will find an entrance to Queen Elizabeth Circle park at the top of this road, where you can find the next 'Stop'

Challenge Questions:

1. Look at the	piece of art: What are	'Dragoons'? M	

- 2. Look at the piece of art: What does 'Chrysophlax' mean?
- 3. Scan the QR code: what real animals might you find in Ham Wood?

STOP 5

Directions

- Walk back to the bottom of Harrison Place and turn left along Roundhead Drive.
- Follow Roundhead Drive to the end and turn right onto Cromwell Avenue
- Follow the road around to the right hand turn into Denbigh Road and the next piece of art is located on this corner.

Challenge Questions:

- 1. Scan the QR code: What year did R.A Chambers publish an article about The Moats? _____
- 2. Looking at the piece of art: What can you find on the Baldington Family Crest?

STOP 6

Directions

- Walk up Denbigh Road towards the grounds of Barley Hill School. At the school fence turn left and walk through the alleyway to Henrietta Road.
- Carry on walking along Henrietta Road, picking up the footpath through to Ludlow Drive.
- Cross Ludlow Drive to the right to pick up a footpath that runs between Nos 13 & 15.
- Follow the footpath into Lenthall Green where you will find 'Stop 6' on our trail.

Challenge Questions:

- 1. Scan the QR code: Who commanded the Parliamentary army locally?
- 2. Looking at the piece of art: What tax was John Hampden opposed to?

STOP 7

Directions

- Continue along the central pathway through Lenthall Green, and follow the pathway between two houses to connect with Langdale Road. Walk straight along Langdale Road and turn right onto Onslow Drive.
- Walk past the entrance to Naseby Close and turn left onto a road that will bring you into Churchill Crescent Play Area. The final piece of art is located on the left of the park when approaching from this direction.

Challenge Questions:

1. Scan the QR code: What are the na	mes of the dogs in the royalist propaganda pamphle
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2. Looking at the piece of art: What colour was 'Bo	y'?
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
